

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

During 2021/2022 year(s), the Water Polo season continued to be affected by the disruption caused by COVID-19 – local competitions, AYC and interstate competitions. The impacts were wide reaching affecting volunteers, coaches, players, clubs and WPWA. Whilst we have been largely fortunate in Western Australia, it has been difficult to coordinate many of the functions necessary to keep competitions running, encourage participation and maintain players motivation to achieve their best.

Against this backdrop, we have achieved much as a Board, spending November to February developing a new Strategic Plan for WPWA (2022-2025) entitled: **Unite-Develop-Lead**.

The key priorities of the strategy are:

- Club Growth
- Facilities Development
- Expand our Sport
- Develop Clubs and Leaders
- Unity

During this season we witnessed the evolution of one new club (Mandurah) and we continued our discussion and planning of new facilities, particularly in the northern suburbs. In some ways, a positive consequence of COVID-19 has been the transition to on-line meetings and this trend has enabled us to hold a number of briefing sessions with all clubs with a focus on maintaining our communication with the regions at the same time as metropolitan clubs.

This grass root expansion is critical for the sport. It is also pleasing to see the endeavours of regional clubs to expand the profile of the sport in their areas. Clubs in the Pilbara, Geraldton and Bunbury continue to work on programs and competitions. Over the time frame of the Strategic Plan, WPWA will be able to further assist these programs, advise on coordination of activities and connect further people to build exposure of the sport and events.

We have undertaken a review of the WA Performance Pathway Program (PPP), which provides a high performance pathway for players without them needing to change clubs, and in 2021/22 occurring during a session littered with highly disrupted competition. With constant feedback from all stakeholders, the implementation of the program will further benefit from refinement and communication.

Support and Supporters

From a governance perspective we have formed a number of Sub-committees to assist the Board in its duties and I would like to extend thanks to those on the Governance and Risk, Finance and Audit, Nominations, Competitions Advisory Group and High Performance committees. The expansion of this support has enabled the Board to tap into knowledge, skills and experience to strengthen and support WPWA goals. Your advice has been invaluable.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

I am writing this Report having had my final season at Water Polo Western Australia. On reflection it was a season of many challenges, much progress and I departed the organisation with it being in a sound financial position.

Our Sport continued to be impacted by COVID-19 and the related Health directives in relation to immunisations and border closures. I would like to thank all clubs and members for being flexible and responding to the often last minute changes in competition and the disappointments whether it was not being able to compete as State Teams or the modified AWL format. Water Polo WA advocated strongly with Water Polo Australia for athletes in the National Age Group Program given the inability of our teams to attend National Championships and the modification to the Summer Slam competition.

Operations were restructured in the WPWA office with new staffing appointments for the 2021/22 Season. Sharan continued in the Development role with a greater focus on Regional development and participation with a successful Grant from the DLGSC. A highlight was the Hedland Spirit Carnival where 120 children from the local communities were exposed to and participated in water polo. Sharan was central to the planning for the inaugural WPA National Championships and the development of the necessary policies relating to coach selection and team selection, uniform and travel arrangements. Clare Barber joined the team initially to provide cover for Sharan who attended the Tokyo Olympics and then in a newly created role of Clubs Coordinator to provide support to clubs and a focus on learning and development. Clubs have had the benefit of support with RevSport, Working With children, Grant applications and a focus on development of WPA referee accreditations. Bruno Barna joined the team in August and brought a great understanding of the game and clubs to the Competition role. He developed robust systems for transparencies in relation to club transfers and requests for dispensations, all integral to the competition integrity. It was a pleasure to work with this highly skilled and dedicated team.



The PPP was in its second season. WPWA play a crucial role of being an independent representative in this partnership between WPA, WAIS and the Australian Water Polo League Clubs providing the Performance Program North and South. The oversight of the programs to ensure effective delivery of a performance program is vital. A review of the program was instigated by WPWA to determine areas for improvement.

The Stroll O Polo program continued to develop with more regular program delivery. This program is central to WPWA delivery of an inclusive program, allowing people who have never played water polo or who are not strong swimmers to participate. Inclusive programs are now integral to funding support from Government and an area that all sports need to deliver on as part of community sport. Clubs ran Stroll O Polo games to promote broader membership and I thank them for their support of this initiative.

WPWA undertook a partnership project with Curtin University Marketing students. Students were briefed on the Country Championships Event and Stroll O Polo and developed a Corporate Marketing and Strategy Plan for both projects. This exercise presented some valuable ideas and current social media approaches that can be implemented.

The successful Australia Day Event at Hillarys Boat Harbour in partnership with North Coast Water Polo Club was held. With a change in location water polo held a prominent position and a Stroll O Polo participation game was able to be incorporated in the program. Our sincere thanks to Dolphins Water Polo Club for the provision of equipment and the support of North Coast for the set up and pack down on the day.

WPWA were successful in a significant funding application for a whole of State regional development plan to build capacity on ground for the delivery of water polo in regional areas. A successful partnership was established with Royal Life Saving Society for the delivery of aquatic events in 3 regional centres. WPWA staff attended Esperance and Kalgoorlie to reignite interest in water polo to support former players now established in these regions. A Women's only Come n Try event was held in Busselton.

With the cancellation of the National Championships due to border closures WPWA held a Junior camp in Northam based at Muresk Institute. The survey of participants conducted post camp reflected a high level of satisfaction and the overwhelming feedback was that players had enjoyed the interaction with members of other clubs.

Season 2021/22 was as always a busy but proactive season for Water Polo WA.

As my final Report, I would like to thank all those members that I have had the pleasure of dealing with over the past $2\frac{1}{2}$ years. It has been a challenging period with COVID 19 but much has been achieved.

A special mention to our Referees, volunteer timekeepers and scorers. Our games would not be possible without you. On occasion these are thankless tasks so I take the opportunity to acknowledge your commitment and thank you for your contribution.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

2021/22 Season was an incredibly busy but rewarding season with many new initiatives and a lot of work undertaken in our Regional areas. With clear Operational Plans for both the Metropolitan and Regional areas much was achieved.

Regional Development

Regional Development was a key area of focus again this year and with the support of a Regional Grant from the DLGSC, WPWA was able to extend its provision of services. It is important WPWA delivers a range of clinics to increase participation and continue growth throughout all country regions. WPWA promoted the development of water polo through regional towns encouraging community engagement through Come n Try days or by providing support to existing water polo clubs in coaching clinics or training sessions.



North

WPWA travelled to Tom Price, Karratha and Port Hedland, where both junior and senior practical coaching clinics were conducted. WPWA were very fortunate to have 2 time Olympian Zoe Arancini travel with us to share and impart her knowledge. While in Karratha, a theory based coaching session was also conducted covering modules for coaches working with development level athletes.

South

WPWA also attended Bunbury and Busselton Water Polo clubs on several occasions conducting coaching clinics and watching weekly games. While in Busselton a coaching clinic was run specifically for women with the aim of introducing more of a non-contact style of water polo to encourage new participation.

Esperance was a particular area of interest and WPWA is trying to rekindle the enthusiasm that once existed in this area. With the help of a couple of newly relocated water polo players, WPWA ran a Come n Try session and a once a week training session/social game has been established in the area.

Partnership with Royal Life Saving Society Western Australia

WPWA, Royal Life Saving Society WA and Artistic Swimming partnered to conduct three events. We held the 'Aquatic Sports Have a Go Day' in Kalgoorlie and Mount Magnet and the 'Spirit Carnival' in Port Hedland. With the extensive Swim and Survive program delivered by RLSS throughout WA, the achievement at Stage 7 Intermediate Level of an egg beater kick aligns with an introduction to water polo. This link is a relationship WPWA wishes to leverage in future with water polo being introduced to participants on learning egg beater kick.

Healthway - SunSmart Clubs

WPWA was again fortunate to have Heathway sponsor the Junior State League, enabling WPWA to keep capitation fees to a minimum. A series of short video clips using our junior players to promote the messages of being Sunsmart, Healthy Eating and drinking plenty of water. The videos were posted on WPWA social media. We would like to thank clubs for their support in this important SunSmart and Healthy eating messaging.



DEVELOPMENT

Performance Pathway Program

The PPP was established and ran from May through to September. There were two centres - North and South. North catering for the Northern clubs including Newman, North Coast, Phantoms, Stirling, Triton and UWA while the Southern Program included clubs from Cockburn, Dolphins, Melville, Peel and Somerset.

The program catered for training over the winter period from May through to September and gave all players the opportunity to be part of a comprehensive training program over winter.

State Teams

The WPA National Championships were scheduled for September and December 2021. As National Championships had not been held for a number of years and a significant amount of work was undertaken to establish current coaching selection policies, team selections, uniform and travel arrangements. Unfortunately WPWA was unable to send State teams away due to COVID-19 border restrictions. This was very disappointing for all involved given the effort that had been put in by all over winter. We would like to acknowledge Travis at TravelTree, who was extremely helpful in dealing with the logistics regarding accommodation, airfares and transport and all the implications of postponements and cancellations.

State Squad shirts and uniforms were organised for squad members through Staunch as recognition of their selection in a State Squad.

The 19U Boys State squad trained as a group with Andrei Kovalenko for several months and participated in the WPWA A grade competition. This was a great initiative as the boys were able to play together against other club teams.

WPWA State Camp.

As the State teams were unable to travel, all squad members were offered the opportunity to attend a training camp at Muresk Institute. Bruno Barna, Alex Gunnell and Sharan Colliss were the coaches/ managers. 29 players attended the camp from all different clubs. The camp was for 3 nights. The facility was excellent including a pool, basketball courts, volley ball courts, football oval and table tennis tables allowing social activities other than water polo. The players had 2 training sessions a day using the Northam pool and the Toodyay pools. Training comprised of swimming, ball skills, tactics and game play. A survey conducted post camp identified a high level of satisfaction and the consistent identification of the enjoyment of meeting players from other clubs.



DEVELOPMENT

Stroll O Polo

Stroll O Polo, a modified form of the game for nonswimmers or those who want less contact in the game was successfully delivered through a program at UWA Aquatic in Winter 2021 and provided an opportunity to introduce the sport to new participants.

After 1½ years at WPWA I resigned in April 2022. I would like to thank Sue Gliddon for her guidance and support during this period. With the need to extend participation in our sport, the undertaking of the Performance Program co-ordination and oversight as a new program and the requirements of DLGSCI to ensure inclusive programs are delivered, this role was both challenging and rewarding. Thank you to all those in the water polo community who supported me in the role.







CLUB DEVELOPMENT

Club Development

This position was a new appointment by WPWA commencing in September 2021 with a focus to provide support to Clubs in administration, learning and development and participation.

Club Forum

The season started with a Club Forum to brief Club representatives on the Season competition, an overview of Child Protection requirements, the new WPA ClubPool resource, Learning and Development opportunities, fundraising through the Australian Sports Foundation and an insight into the Tokyo 2020 Olympics from Zoe Arancini. The Forum presents as an important opportunity to learn of club support needs.

Learning and Development

With the introduction of the new Water Polo Australia Membership and Registration policy that allowed access to all WPA accreditations and Learning and Development free, WPWA had a focus to ensure this opportunity was taken by members. Referees are a crucial part of our game. Guided Community Referee and Development Referee course were launched. The idea between these courses is to support members in the learning process and the necessary documentation required for the accreditation to be formally acknowledged and to allow co-ordination of group sessions for the Practical Evaluations. I would like to acknowledge the efforts of Liz Burman, Gabor Boros, Fiona Haigh and Mark Balenzuela our nominated WPA Referee Developers in undertaking assessments and providing mentoring for our Development referees and Sharan Colliss for her assistance with Community referee assessments. Community referee practical evaluations were incorporated into the Saturday morning District Schools competition at UWA Water Polo Club and Flippaball at Melville Water Polo Club. I would like to acknowledge the co-operation of Alyssa Thom and Steph Neesham in providing these development opportunities.

Two club based referee programs at Somerset Water Polo and Phantoms Water Polo were also initiated to facilitate development. These sessions were well supported and enabled members to incorporate their learning with club based games.

A referee development workshop was held in November 2021 with Don Smyth from WPA and was well attended, with Regional participation via Zoom. The session provided an opportunity to discuss interpretations and watch decisions in slow motion and replay a luxury not afforded to our game referees!

A Guided Coach course was initiated for coaches working with Development players and we had five coaches participate. With the redevelopment by WPA of the coaching accreditation requirements, while an accreditation was not officially gained the members developed a good understanding of skill development. I would like to acknowledge Georgina Kovacs- Muller for running a workshop. We look forward to the finalisation of WPA accreditations in coaching and having a platform for future coach development.



CLUB DEVELOPMENT

Competition Officials

Two workshops were held for club members to gain accreditation as a Competition Official. This is a requirement for Clubs participating at the Australian Youth Championships (AYC), and these workshops provide parents, carers and supporters a practical run down of how to use the clock and running sheet (scoresheet) for the AYC and other competitions.

WPA have set as a core requirement of the Competition Official Course the lodgment of a valid Working With Children Card (WWCC). Therefore, some accreditations are not fully recognised in Member profiles.

Club Support

Support has been provided to Clubs throughout the season with RevSport enquiries and administration. It is recognized that with club volunteers and change in positions there is a need for support with RevSport use to ensure the management system is used effectively and efficiently for registrations, competition team entry, refunds, requests for dispensation and events. A Team entry manual was provided to clubs for use by Teams Managers prior to season commencement and we hope to further develop these resources.

Following the Department of Communities audit of Working With Children requirements at WPWA in 2020, support has been provided to clubs to ensure fulfilment of obligations. Information was provided at the Club Forum and throughout the season. It must be recognised by members there are two levels of Working with children obligation, when acting as a volunteer at their club, a current valid WWCC must be provided to the Club/Association unless exempt and a second level of lodgment of a WWCC with WPWA through a member profile as a core requirement for recognition of any WPA accreditation or as an employee of WPWA.

Assistance was provided to clubs with grant applications and Clubs were successful in gaining funding for essential equipment. Peel Water Polo Club received a grant from Rockingham City Council for a new scoreboard at Rockingham, Cockburn Water Polo Club and Somerset received funding through the Federal Government's Stronger Communities Funding Round 7 for equipment and new goals. Further support has been provided to Clubs in terms of governance issues with use and identification of resources in the WPA ClubPool.

PERFORMANCE PATHWAY PROGRAM

The PPP has been operational since May 2021. It is an opportunity now to remember the purpose/intent of the program, the stakeholders committed to its success, and to report on some of the key performance measures (results).

Purpose

The purpose of the PPP is to optimise the collective experience, expertise, enthusiasm, and resources in our sport to position WA as the leading Water Polo State in Australia in terms of performances at National level (AWL, NSC and AYC) and representation in National programs. In addition, the PPP is designed to support the coaching, officiating, and playing capability and capacity of all Clubs and Associations in WA, complementing the broader initiatives to be undertaken as part of the National Strategic Framework (NSF), which places Participants, Clubs and Sustainability at the core of all we do.

Stakeholders

The WA Performance Program (WAPP) is a partnership between:

- WPA
- WPWA
- WAIS
- All WA Water Polo Clubs and Associations

The PPP comprises two programs known as WAPPP – North and WAPPP – South. Each program delivers pathways from 15&U to Open level and are conducted through the off-season period from approximately May to September.

WAPPP Operating Model

The PPP is based on the following operational principles:

- The PPP has two conferences: North (WAPPP-N) and South (WAPPP-S), with programs split into two distinct phases during the year.
- The WAPPP-S is delivered through a partnership between WPA, WPWA, Melville Water Polo Club and the Southern Conference Clubs (Dolphins Water Polo Club, Cockburn Water Polo Club, Somerset Water Polo Club, and Peel Water Polo Club).
- The WAPPP-N is delivered through a partnership between WPA, WPWA, UWA Water Polo Club and the Northern Conference Clubs (Newman Water Polo Club, North Coast Water Polo Club, Stirling Water Polo Club, Triton Water Polo Club and Phantoms Water Polo Club).



- The PPP is available to members of Clubs and Regional Associations.
- The AWL Clubs (UWA and Melville) are party to a Service Level Agreement (SLA) with WPWA to deliver the PPP.
- WPA, WAIS and WPWA are in a tri-party agreement for the delivery of services through the WAPP to Categorised Athletes.
- WPA provides funding to WPWA to support the payment of the WAPP Head Coaches.
- The Head Coaches of the PPP are employed directly by the AWL Clubs.
- The appointment of PPP Age Group coaches is managed by WPWA.



PERFORMANCE PATHWAY PROGRAM

- The Head Coaches of the WAPPP are employed directly by the AWL Clubs.
- The appointment of WAPPP Age Group coaches is managed by WPWA.
- Selection of players into the respective WAPPP is conducted via Selection Panels appointed by WPWA and consistent with the guidelines provided by WPA as part of the National Performance Framework (NPF).
- The calendar year will be broken into two distinct phases.
- In Season (School Terms 1 and 4) refers to the traditional Water Polo season from approximately October through to March. All players and coaches will be based with their Clubs in Competition mode during this time.
- Off Season (School Terms 2 and 3) which is when the WAPP will be conducted refers to the period between approximately May and September. Players and coaches will be selected/appointed to be part of the WAPPP during this time. Clubs will not run programs involving these athletes during this period.
- WAIS provides Sports Science Sports Medicine (SSSM) support only to Nationally Categorised Athletes through the WAIS facilities and personnel.
- The WAPPP's will in time be required to provide a basic level of SSSM support at an age-appropriate level.
- All Nationally Categorised Players will have Individual Player Plans (IPP's) developed and monitored by the appointed WAIS Program Manager (p/T) in conjunction with WPA National Performance Director and respective Performance Program Head Coach(s).

The WAIS Individual Athlete Program (IAP) provides services and support to Western Australian high performance athletes who are not scholarship holders with a WAIS operated sport program.

The program contains both a scholarship program (IAS – Individual Athlete Scholarship) and a grant (WACG – WA Connect Grant).

The scholarship program is designed to assist athletes who need access to WAIS services and facilities to support an externally coached and managed training environment. The WACG grant provides either assistance to relocate or to retain connected with your sport and family once relocated.

IAP Scholarships

Scholarships are awarded based on the athlete's current and forecast performance standard. There are six categories of scholarship available. For an athlete to be considered for the Program they must be currently nominated to one of these categories by their NSO. The scholarship benefits are assigned based on scholarship category and individualised to assist the athlete's specific requirements.

The AWL Finals Series held in Sydney with WA FINA Referees Fiona Haigh refereeing the Gold medal women's match and Gabor Boros the Bronze medal match for men. Congratulations to Fiona Haigh who was awarded Referee of the finals series.

New Accredited Referees

During the year there was a big push to get referees accredited. With the new WPA registration policy and free accreditation courses WPWA had many members indicate interest in becoming accredited as a WPA Referee.

My thanks go to Clare Barber who was very diligent in ensuring that the referees did their online modules then an Observation Task of watching an Advanced Referee, Shadow Task where they referee with an Accredited Referee Developer and then their practical assessments where they hope to pass to finalise their Referee Accreditation.

Headsets

This season WPWA purchased 2 sets of referee headsets for use during the season. They have been very useful for the referees to communicate with each other during the game and with the table delegate to pass information, and a great addition to the learning and development of Community referees incorporating their use in the Observation Task.

During the WA Country Championships held in Karratha this year they were used during each game and Liz Burman as Technical Director/Delegate was able to communicate and pass directives immediately to the referees that were refereeing, this proved to be a great learning tool for the Country Referees.

Referee Pay

WPWA changed the referee pay scale to encourage club referees to become WPA Accredited Referees. The pay scale recognises those referees who are accredited with a graded payment. This was a win win situation for WPWA with many referees seeking formal accreditation and duly recognising their efforts to develop their skills and knowledge.

REFEREES

Issues Facing Referees

Problems during the season were inevitable and mainly due to games being moved or cancelled on short notice and sourcing of referees for games on Friday nights or midweek for A Grade.

The disrespectful behaviour shown towards referees unfortunately is becoming worse. It comes in many forms during a game from the eye rolling, comments from either the water or the bench, shaking of the head in disagreeing with a call, from both players and coaches. This has led to some referees refusing to officiate any more.

This year the violence towards other players was worse than normal with 23 red card incidents including 13 for brutality or violence. The support given to referees from the WPWA Office when writing reports for red card incidents has greatly improved and is appreciated. This aspect of our game must however be addressed by all members and will be a focus next season.



General

One of our WA FINA Referees Fiona Haigh left Perth and moved to Karratha for work. This of course was a loss to Perth but a gain for the Karratha and Port Hedland Water Polo Community, gaining a top class referee in Fiona to guide them.

Many thanks to all involved, especially Sue Gliddon, Sharan Colliss, Clare Barber & Bruno Barna in the WPWA Office for their support of referees throughout the WA Water Polo season. Sue Gliddon & Sharan Colliss have both resigned from WPWA at the end of the season. This is a great loss as Sue had just got her feet firmly settled and was taking the sport of water polo to great and better heights.

Congratulations to all who have organised, helped, refereed, played, watched and generally contributed to yet another highly successful year of Masters Water Polo in Perth. The Perth competition is one of the largest group of Masters water polo playing regularly in any place in any country around the globe.



This season we asked our members how they would like the season to be delivered, in as much as we have ever diminished numbers for a variety of reasons. It was decided that we have a 45+/60+ combination comp and the 70+/Pinkies would continue to play their games.

This is likely to change for the upcoming season when we revert to our 45+, 55+, 65+ competitions. Some of our older players are now approaching 80, which in and of itself is a testament to our sport and the players for their commitment to their wellbeing both physically and socially.

COMPETITIONS REPORT

A Grade

After a post season review of the A grade competition, a new structure was introduced for the 2021/22 season with six teams competing in the men's competition and four teams in the women's. With Dolphins rebuilding and unfortunately unable to field a team in the men's competition, the opportunity was taken to have the State Under 19 team play as the sixth team as both a selection and tournament preparation opportunity. Unfortunately border closure prevented the team from competing at the National level.

The Men's Grand Final was a thrilling game won by Triton against UWA Flotsam in a penalty shoot out 13 to 12. The Women's competition was won by the Melville Marlins against UWA by 15 to 13.



Senior State League

Over the last ten years, the growth in the lower grade competitions has meant that, in the current format and available pool space, the competition is almost at capacity. In 2011/12, there were 27 men's teams playing on Wednesday nights and 21 women's teams. There are now 43 and 34 respectively. This will be a key challenge for WPWA and the Clubs to work together and resolve. This season saw Wednesday night competition saw 681 games played across 12 different division with a G grade competition for men played for the first time.

SunSmart Junior State League

The JSL saw 451 games played across the four age divisions and A and B competitions in each age group. With all games currently played at HBF Stadium (and Hale School) on Sunday afternoons and Monday nights, the key challenge with the JSL is to be able to look at the decentralisation of the competition making it easier for players



from Joondalup to the north and Mandurah to the south to be able participate. The reduction in the number of Clubs competing in the A competitions is another key challenge for the JSL.

WAWPI is extremely grateful for the continued support provided by Heathway to be able to keep the cost of participation down.

KAP 7 Cup

With border closures impacting on the two WA AWL Clubs being able to participate in the regular AWL season, the WA KAP 7 Cup was played locally across a five-game series. The Fremantle Mariners won the men's series 3 games to 2 with the Fremantle Marlins victors over the UWA Torpedoes in the women's 4 games to 1.

Rather than run the Challenge Cup, an AWL Reserves game was implemented ahead of the main fixtures providing a good opportunity for the non-playing AWL Squad members and developing players to be exposed to a higher standard of competition as well as providing development opportunities for the up-and-coming referees.

Australian Youth Water Polo Championships

Originally scheduled to be held in Perth, the 2022 edition of the AYC was relocated and rescheduled to Brisbane over Easter. Uncertainty around COVID-19 restrictions limited participation in the tournament by WA teams with a number of players entering the draft to play with interstate teams. Well done to the following teams that were successful in winning medals:

The Western Australian Country Championships are held annually across the state by host regional associations. In 2022, Karratha Water Polo Association (KWPA) hosted the event over the long weekend in March at the Karratha Leisureplex.

Tournament Summary

Hosting the Championships provided KWPA with an opportunity to organise and run a high level regionally based sports event and showcase water polo to the wider community to grow participation. This tournament was also a fantastic opportunity for players and officials from regional areas to come together to play and officiate at elite levels.

Six towns were represented in the championships; Karratha, Hedland, Geraldton, Bunbury, Busselton and Peel with over 160 participants making up 13 teams. Over 18 referees were engaged to officiate the tournament with 13 achieving accreditations as Development Referees. KWPA ensured that our table officials were accredited prior to the event with 18 members successfully completing the WPA Competition Official online course.

The ever changing COVID restrictions and a possible cyclone looming off the coast certainly put the event organisers to the test in the lead up. However, the tournament was officially opened by City of Karratha Mayor Peter Long on Friday and everything ran like clockwork over the following three days. The success of our event can be attributed to the many members of the KWPA who volunteered their time to ensure that the tournament ran as smoothly as possible. They should all be commended for their mammoth efforts prior to and during the event.

After a gruelling three days of competing, the grand finals commenced on Sunday with Karratha Men and Women taking on Geraldton Men and Women in two intense and exceptional grand finals. In a very close contest, Karratha Women kept their lead for the entire game and finished in front with a score line of 12–11. Karratha Men also had a close final. At half time the score line was concerning with Karratha trailing by 5 goals however the home side took control and finished victorious 13–11.

This was just KWPA's second time hosting the event since its incorporation in 2013. This year, however, was our Associations first time walking away victorious with the premiership shields for both men's and women's side in equally nail-biting grand finals.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Board has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity on the basis that, in the opinion of the Board, there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy, specifically, all of their information needs. Accordingly, this financial report is a special purpose financial report, which has been prepared to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA)*.

The financial report covers Water Polo Western Australia Incorporated as an individual entity which has been formed, and is domiciled in Australia. The Association is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial report was approved by the Board as at the date of the Boards' report.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the *Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA)*, the recognition and measurement requirements specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of:

AASB 101	Presentation of Financial Statements
AASB 107	Statement of Cash Flows
AASB 108	Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
AASB 1054	Australian Additional Disclosures

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

(a) Basis of preparation of the financial report

Historical Cost Convention

The financial report has been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Going Concern

The financial report has been prepared on the going concern basis. In arriving at the position the Board has had regard to the fact that, the Association has, or in the Board's opinion will have access to, sufficient cash to fund administrative and other committed expenditure for a period of at least 12 months from the date of signing the financial report (the "Period").

In forming this view, the Board has taken into consideration the following:

- The Association receives a significant portion of its income from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries ("DLGSCI") and other key funding and sponsorship providers (the "Significant Sources of Funding"). It is expected that the Significant Sources of Funding for the Period will be comparable to prior years which will enable the Association to pay all its liabilities and commitments as and when they fall due for a period of at least 12 months from the date of approval of the financial report.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(a) Basis of preparation of the financial report (continued)

Should the Association not achieve the matters set out above there is significant uncertainty whether the Association will continue as a going concern and therefore whether it will realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities in the normal course of operations and at the amounts stated in the financial report. The financial report does not include any adjustment relating to the recoverability or classification of recorded asset amounts or to the amounts or classification of liabilities that might be necessary should the Association not be able to continue as a going concern.

Significant accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of the financial report requires the use of certain estimates and judgements in applying the Association's accounting policies. Those estimates and judgements significant to the financial report are disclosed in Note 2 to the financial statements.

New and revised accounting standards effective at 30 June 2022

The Association has applied all new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that apply to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 July 2021. Application of the new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have a material impact on the financial report.

Accounting Standards issued but not yet effective

The Australian Accounting Standards Board ("AASB") has issued a number of new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods, some of which are relevant to the Association. The Association has decided not to early adopt any of these new and amended pronouncements. The Association is currently in the process of assessing any potential impact.

(b) Revenue

Grants and sponsorship revenue

Where grant and sponsorship revenue arises from an agreement which is for the transfer of goods or services, is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations then the revenue is recognised when those obligations have been met. Other grant and sponsorship revenue is recognised on an accrual basis when the Association has gained control of the asset.

Revenue from the provision of services

Revenue from the provision of services comprises revenue derived from participation and events. The Association recognises revenue when it satisfies the performance obligation associated with the service either over time or at a point in time, depending on the nature of the service provided.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it accrues.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(c) Financial instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the Association commits itself to either the purchase or sale of the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified as fair value through profit or loss, in which case transaction costs are immediately recognised as expenses in the income statement.

Classification of financial assets

Financial assets recognised by the Association are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, subject to their classification and whether the Association irrevocably designates the financial asset on initial recognition at fair value through other comprehensive income ("FVtOC") in accordance with the relevant criteria in AASB 9 *Financial Instruments*.

Financial assets not irrevocably designated on initial recognition at FVtOCI are classified as subsequently measured at amortised cost, FVtOCI or fair value through profit or loss ("FVtPL") on the basis of both:

- (a) the Association's business model for managing the financial assets; and
- (b) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables arise from the Association's transactions with third parties and are normally settled within 30 days.

Consistent with both the Association's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the assets, trade and other receivables are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Classification of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities classified as held-for-trading, contingent consideration payable by the Association for the acquisition of a business, and financial liabilities designated at FVtPL, are subsequently measured at fair value.

All other financial liabilities recognised by the Association are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

(d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and at banks, short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less held at call with financial institutions, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

(e) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(f) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and purchased assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(g) Inventories

Inventories held for sale are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(h) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of plant and equipment is measured at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all other plant and equipment is depreciated over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held available for use, consistent with the estimated consumption of the economic benefits embodied in the asset.

(i) Impairment of non-financial assets

Goodwill, intangible assets not yet ready for use and intangible assets with indefinite useful lives are not subject to amortisation and are therefore tested annually for impairment, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that they might be impaired.

For impairment assessment purposes, assets are generally grouped at the lowest levels for which there are largely independent cash flows ("cash generating units"). Accordingly, most assets are tested for impairment at the cash-generating unit level. Because it does not generate cash flows independently of other assets or groups of assets, goodwill is allocated to the cash generating unit or units that are expected to benefit from the synergies arising from the business combination that gave rise to the goodwill.

Assets other than goodwill, intangible assets not yet ready for use and intangible assets with indefinite useful lives are assessed for impairment whenever events or circumstances arise that indicate the asset may be impaired.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(i) Impairment of non-financial assets (continued)

An impairment loss is recognised when the carrying amount of an asset or cash generating unit exceeds the asset's or cash generating unit's recoverable amount. The recoverable amount of an asset or cash generating unit is defined as the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and value in use (where 'value in use' is determined as the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit).

Impairment losses in respect of individual assets are recognised immediately in the income statement unless the asset is measured at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease and is recognised in other comprehensive income to the extent that it does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for the same class of asset. Impairment losses in respect of cash generating units are allocated first against the carrying amount of any goodwill attributed to the cash generating unit with any remaining impairment loss allocated on a pro rata basis to the other assets comprising the relevant cash generating unit.

A reversal of an impairment loss for an asset measured at cost is recognised in the income statement. A reversal of an impairment loss for an asset measured at a revalued amount is treated as a revaluation increase and is recognised in other comprehensive income, except to the extent that an impairment loss on the same class of asset was previously recognised in the income statement, in which case a reversal of that impairment loss is also recognised in the income statement.

(j) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term employee benefit obligations

Liabilities arising in respect of wages and salaries, annual leave and other employee benefits (other than termination benefits) expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the reporting period are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts based on remuneration rates which are expected to be paid when the liability is settled. The expected cost of short-term employee benefits in the form of compensated absences such as annual leave is recognised in the provision for employee benefits. All other short-term employee benefit obligations are presented as payables in the statement of financial position.

(ii) Long-term employee benefit obligations

The provision for other long-term employee benefits, including obligations for long service leave and annual leave, which are not expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the reporting period, are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflow to be made in respect of the services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee turnover, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that are denominated in the currency in which the benefits will be paid. Any remeasurements for changes in assumptions of obligations for other long-term employee benefits are recognised in the income statement in the periods in which the change occurs.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(j) Employee benefits (Continued)

Other long-term employee benefit obligations are presented as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the Association does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, regardless of when the actual settlement is expected to occur. All other long-term employee benefit obligations are presented as non-current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

(k) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(I) Leases

At the commencement date of a lease (other than leases of 12-months or less and leases of low value assets), the Association recognises a lease asset representing its right to use the underlying asset and a lease liability representing its obligation to make lease payments.

Lease assets

Lease assets are initially recognised at cost, comprising the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date of the lease, less any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred by the Association, and an estimate of costs to be incurred by the Association in dismantling and removing the underlying asset, restoring the site on which it is located or restoring the underlying asset to the condition required by the terms and conditions of the lease, unless those costs are incurred to produce inventories.

Subsequent to initial recognition, lease assets are measured at cost (adjusted for any remeasurement of the associated lease liability), less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment loss.

Lease assets are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and the estimated useful life of the underlying asset, consistent with the estimated consumption of the economic benefits embodied in the underlying asset.

Lease liabilities

Lease liabilities are initially recognised at the present value of the future lease payments (i.e., the lease payments that are unpaid at the commencement date of the lease). These lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined, or otherwise using the Association's incremental borrowing rate.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(I) Leases (continued)

Subsequent to initial recognition, lease liabilities are measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments (i.e., the lease payments that are unpaid at the reporting date). Interest expense on lease liabilities is recognised in the income statement (presented as a component of finance costs). Lease liabilities are remeasured to reflect changes to lease terms, changes to lease payments and any lease modifications not accounted for as separate leases.

Variable lease payments not included in the measurement of lease liabilities are recognised as an expense when incurred.

Leases of 12-months or less and leases of low value assets

Lease payments made in relation to leases of 12-months or less and leases of low value assets (for which a lease asset and a lease liability has not been recognised) are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(m) Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures.

NOTE 2: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

(a) Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill

All assets are assessed for impairment at each reporting date by evaluating whether indicators of impairment exist in relation to the continued use of the asset by the consolidated entity. Impairment triggers include declining product or manufacturing performance, technology changes, adverse changes in the economic or political environment and future product expectations. If an indicator of impairment exists the recoverable amount of the asset is determined.

The recoverable amount of a CGU is based on value in use calculations. These calculations are based on projected cash flows approved by management covering a minimum period of 1 year (maximum of five years). Management's determination of cash flow projections and gross margins are based on past performance and its expectation for the future.

(b) Revenue and other income

The Association derives revenue and other income from a range of activities, including revenue from the sale of goods, the provision of services and income from grants. In accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, the Association is required to determine whether it is appropriate to recognise revenue and other income in the financial year in which cash or non-cash assets are received or to defer the recognition of revenue and other income until associated obligations and/or conditions (if any) are satisfied. In making this judgement, the Association considers the guidance outlined in AASB 15 *Revenue from Contracts with Customers* and AASB 1058 *Income of Not-for-Profit Entities* and, in particular, whether the arrangement relates to the transfer of goods or services and contains enforceable and sufficiently specific performance obligations. Where the Association identifies the existence of transfer of goods or services, enforceable and sufficiently specific performance obligations, or the arrangement requires the Association to use the funds received to acquire or construct items of property, plant and equipment to identified specifications, the recognition of revenue and other income is deferred until the identified obligations are satisfied.
